### CO/WY Tri-Star Basketball Finals Date Announced by Jack Rife

This year, the Final Competition of the Colorado/Wyoming District Tri-Star Basketball Competition will be held on Saturday, April 4, 2015 in conjunction with the Denver Nuggets game (vs. the LA Clippers). 144 winners of Regional Competitions will be invited to compete in the Finals event that will be held in the afternoon prior



to the Nuggets game and will be conducted in the basketball arena of Metro State University (next to the Pepsi Center). At the Nuggets game that night, the 12 - 1<sup>st</sup> Place winners of the competition will be introduced to the crowd in a pre-game ceremony and the 36 top scorers will participate in the Nuggets Fan Tunnel and in the Flag Ceremony (during the National Anthem).

### **Tri-Star Basketball Finals Continued**

Four Regional Tournaments (North in Greely, South in Pueblo, East Metro and West Metro Denver) are currently being organized and are expected to occur on the weekends of March 14 or 21. Each Regional event will send the top 3 boys and top 3 girls from each of the 6 age categories (36 winners in all) to the Finals. Winners will also receive a trophy, t-shirt and a free ticket to the Nuggets game that night.

Tri-Star Basketball is a skills competition (shooting, passing and dribbling) for boys and girls age 8 to 13. All clubs are encouraged to sponsor a Local Competition and to send their 36 winners on to one of the Regional Tournaments. These local contests should be finished by March 7 at the latest since the Regionals will be held the following weekends. The cost of trophies at the Regionals and Finals are paid through club registration fees, which will be \$125 this year. Details regarding Regional times and locations along with Club Registration Forms will be mailed to Club Presidents and past Tri-Star Basketball Chairpersons in December.

It is not too early for Clubs to begin planning their Tri-Star Basketball competition for kids in their area. If you need help planning an event, please contact one of the Coordinators listed below! Most years we have approxi-
