Sweet Dreams in a Bag provides children who are moving out of homelessness and shelters, a pillow, new twin bed sheets, twin fleece blanket, and comforter in a reusable vinyl zippered bag that will fit under the child's bed. If the family has to move — all a child has to do is stuff their bedroom back in the vinyl bag and take it with them. The unique thing about the program is that the child gets to pick their bedding from our inventory and then we personalize the bag with their name. We also include a personalized instructional

booklet about caring for your belongings and helping the child realize just how awesome they are. Also included are a toothbrush and toothpaste and a small age appropriate toy.

## News from Breakfast OC of Windsor Gardens by Donna Bishop, President

Second Quarter

On January 11, 2017 the club presented a check for \$2, 560 to the Family coordinator, Connie Payne, at Sable Elementary School in Aurora. The school will use the money for uniforms and supplies for the homeless children who enroll throughout the school year. Optimist raised the funds by selling 350 boxes of Palisade Peaches in the summer of 2016.

December 14, 2016 we charter a JOI club at Place Bridge Academy with fifteen middle school students. In January nine more students submitted applications for membership. Seven adult Optimist are working with the new program including Gary Roll as chairperson and our Optimist school advisor, Jacqueline Chambliss. The JOI members are currently developing ideas for service projects within their school population of 1000 preschoolers through eighth graders with over 50 native languages. The school is a model for educating refugee students.

Historically, Breakfast Optimist Club of Windsor Gardens has provided money to Pickens Technical College in Aurora for them to award scholarships. This year we established a formal Scholarship Committee chaired by Dr. Barbara Medina to announce a 2017 scholarship sponsored by our club. The scholarship announcement and criteria will be posted on the Pickens' Website.

Applications are due March 31, 2017. Dr. Medina and her committee will select recipient(s) by early April.

Our October speaker at the Breakfast Optimist Club of Windsor Gardens was Lisa Gelaude, Manager of Volunteer and Corporate Engagement for Urban Peak which is a local non-profit serving homeless youth between ages of 15 to 24. A continues need of these young people is for clean, dry socks. Our club will sponsor a "sock shop" during March to help Urban Peak meet this need.

#### T1DOC Supporting Camp Colorado How Your Club Can Help a Kid - Ron Gustas

The **Type 1 Diabetes Optimist Club (T1DOC)** again this year is working on a project to help send kids with **Type 1 Diabetes (T1D)** to **Camp Colorado** conducted by the **American Diabetes Association (ADA).** The camp will be held from July 2 thru July 7, 2017 at Eagle Lake camp in the heart of the Pike National Forest located about 9 miles from Woodland Park, Colorado. Members of the **T1DOC** want to thank those **"Optimist Clubs"** and individual **"Optimists"** who helped send kids to **Camp** last year and also thank those who have **already provided** financial support to send kids to the upcoming **2017 Camp**. Our goal this year is to help at least **30 kids** and their families.

**T1D** is a very expensive disease with increasing costs for insulin, other supplies, and ongoing medical care. Families, even with insurance have a hard time funding the \$600+ cost they need to send a child to Camp. Because of required around the clock glucose level monitoring most of these kids have no other opportunity to participate in an almost week long summer camp. **Camp Colorado** operates with over 100+ medically trained volunteers providing this 24/7 care.

Your Club can help in any of the following ways:



**Underwriting the cost of a "Campership".** A donation of \$310 covers about half of a child's cost to go to Camp. Smaller donations can be pooled with those from other donors. The **T1DOC** will again conduct an on-line auction in May hoping to raise \$10,000 to fund

"Camperships" and T1D research. "Optimist" members who can provide auction items are asked to contact the below T1DOC members. Gift cards/certificates, travel packages, wine baskets, event tickets, sports memorabilia items, lodging deals, greens fees, etc., etc. etc., make great auction items.

Watch for more information and be an active bidder when the on-line auction runs from May 12<sup>th</sup> to May 21<sup>st</sup>. More info to follow.
