

The club **adopted this school 10 years ago and has given thousands of books to the children!**




## NW Denver OC Holds Virtual Spaghetti Dinner and Raffle

## Optimist Clubs See Glass Half Full—Even in a Pandemic Says OI President Mark Weinsoff in the Wall Street Journal

Leaders of organization work to stay upbeat in face of declining membership, litany of dreadful news. The Optimist International club hasn't survived 110 years, two world wars, a Great Depression and untold other miseries and disasters by dwelling on the dark side of life.

Even so, the past year has been a trying one for the pre-eminent glass-half-full organization. There has been a deadly global pandemic, deep political discord and, perhaps most vexing for the club itself, a membership that is "aging out," or, as a pessimist might put it, "dying off."

**The club's president, 63-year-old retired banker Mark Weinsoff, still found reason for some optimism when reached a few days after last month's deadly riot at the U.S. Capitol. "Whatever doesn't kill you makes you stronger," he said.**

**Mr. Weinsoff sees it as his club's mission to keep optimism alive and thriving in the face of the litany of bad news. "When bad things happen," he said, "a pessimist reasons that 'this always happens to me and it will happen again.' An optimist says, 'OK, now what do I do to move forward?'"**

Optimist International was founded with a mission to guide "delinquent boys" to the right side of the tracks. Women were first admitted in 1987. The umbrella organization, based in St. Louis, oversees some 2,500 individual chapters around the world.

## Tamarac OC at Colorado Feeding Kids Linda Williams




## Oratorical Contest Goes Virtual for 2021 Steve Gorrell

The Oratorical Contest is open to students who have not reached the age of 19 before October 1, 2020, and are not enrolled as a degree seeking student of a post-secondary institution.

This year's topic is: **"Healing the World with Optimism"**

All contest will be Combined Gender. Clubs will send their 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> place winners to the Zone Contest. The Zone Lt Governor's will set the time, date and location for the Zone Contest.

1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> place Zone winners will then go to a Regional Contest.

1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> place Regional winners will the go to the District Finals being held April 24<sup>th</sup>, 2021 at the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter Conference.

The District 1<sup>st</sup> place winner will receive a \$2,500 scholarship and then will be able to go to the Regional/World Championships Contest at St Louis University in St Louis, MO. Where the possibility to win up to additional 20,000 in scholarships. 2<sup>nd</sup> place District winner will receive a 1,500 scholarship and 3<sup>rd</sup> place District winner will receive a 1,000 scholarship.

The Club contest must be completed on or before March 14,2021.


The Zone contest must be completed on or before March 28,2021

The Regional contest must be completed on or before April 11,2021

The Club will pay a onetime entry fee of 20.00 per entrant that goes to the Zone contest payable to the District.

All contestants must speak on the official topic in the first sentence of the speech. Timing will begin with the first spoken word.





## 2021 Optimist Brain Bowl Virtual Tournament Gunar Neumann

The Optimist Brain Bowl is an academic team competition for middle school students throughout the CO/WY Optimist District. Under normal circumstances, three regional in-person contests are held on different weekends, followed by a championship in-person contest in which the top six teams at each grade level in the three regional contests compete for bragging rights. Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, we could not hold in-person contests, nor could we perform in-person training of our volunteers.



The Brain Bowl Committee began exploring options in late summer of 2020, and ultimately decided to hold a virtual **Brain Bowl tournament on 30 JAN 2021 using the Google Meet On-line platform**. One of the reasons we selected Google Meet was that many schools already use this tool, so the majority of the contestants were familiar with it. We also used Google Meet to train our readers and scorekeepers. In fact, one of our readers joined us from St. Louis, MO.

We were able to accommodate every school that wanted to participate and as a result, **44 Teams comprising 205 students from 20 schools participated in this event**. We had teams from as far away as Casper, WY; Walden, Merino (near Sterling), and Canon City. **First place honors went to Stargate 6A in Thornton, Summit 7A in Boulder, and Summit 8A in Boulder**. All the results are posted on the Brain Bowl website at [www.optimistbrainbowl.org](http://www.optimistbrainbowl.org).

Overall, the event was a success, in spite of some technical issues we faced. Since we had anticipated two of the biggest technical glitches we ran into, we were able to handle those glitches without major difficulties. **We staffed twenty-two competition rooms** for each of the four rounds of preliminary contests in the morning, and then we staffed the afternoon elimination rounds of 12 and 6 and 6 rooms “as usual.”

We heard over and over again from the team coaches **how grateful the students and parents were** to have a Virtual Brain Bowl this year. Here are some of the comments we received:

**From Chinook Trail MS:** “Brain Bowl is such a highlight for these kids in this crazy semester (last week, one sixth grader said that Brain Bowl practice day was her favorite day of the week).”

**From Stargate MS:** “We appreciate very much all your heroic efforts in making this happen. It would have been so much easier for you cancelling this year's competition. We are very **thankful to you all.**”

**While it would have been easier to just cancel the Brain Bowl for 2021, we were determined that as Optimists and in keeping with Gov Terri Kearney's theme of “Putting the Pieces Together”, the Brain Bowl Committee would put on a virtual contest for the youth.** Although we tried to keep this contest as close as possible to the in-person tournaments, we ended up with a completely different event. It took a lot of people coming together over 6 months to plan and implement this contest, but we made it happen. **On behalf of the Brain Bowl Committee, I thank all of the volunteers for their efforts and hard work to make this event a success.**

Historically, we have paid \$ 1,000 to each of the seven age group winners and \$ 500 to the other qualifiers.

To provide that financial assistance and to run the qualifiers, we need to raise \$50,000. Our fundraisers include hole and participant sponsorships at the qualifiers (a Sponsorship Opportunities flyer is included elsewhere in this newsletter), an **adult golf scramble tentatively scheduled for May 18 at Saddle Rock Golf Course in Aurora**, and a **silent auction with donated foursomes from some of the premier Denver-area golf courses**.

**In addition to our fund-raising activities, we're looking for volunteers to assist at the qualifiers. You don't need to be a golfer to volunteer.** You just need to be able to enjoy the outdoors and help kids.

## Awards & Achievement Awardee for "Zoom Fundraiser"


