

**Packs of Hope** is a nonprofit organization that was spotlighted at our First Quarter


Conference 2019. They are a 100% donation organization that fills backpacks for children who are entering foster care. Due to COVID-19 and lack

# Wyo. Independent Citizens Coalition receives award

CHEYENNE – After less than two years together, the Wyoming Independent Citizens Coalition is being recognized for its impact on the Cheyenne community.

The group received the latest
Compassion-in-Action Award from
Compassionate Cheyenneon Saturday at St. Joseph's Catholic Church.
WICC's main mission is to represent
and give voice to people and groups in
the community that are underrepresented or have been neglected,
challenge systemic and structural
racism, and to promote diversity,
especially in the school district, vice
president Carla Gregorio said.

In her nomination letter, St. Joseph's Food Pantry Director Renee Gamino wrote that WICC "has been concerned about the suffering of the misfortunes of another and (is) moved to do something about it."

"Whether you know it or not ... that's our definition of compassion," Compassionate Cheyenne working group member Ed Boenisch said while presenting a certificate to four of WICC's volunteers. Each organization to be a warded also receives \$100 from the Sunrise Rotary Club.

Another thing about the organization that caught Compassionate Cheyenne's attention, Boenischsaid,

was WICC's desire to partner with other community organizations, as well as "loving your neighbor and speaking truth and facts, and to represent people that ... were marginalized and voiceless, and that needed some kind of a support and representation."

Boenisch said it was rare that Compassionate Cheyenne would give the award to such a new group, but that WICC has already made such an impact on the community through its work to elevate underrepresented communities.

Gamino's letter noted several recent contributions by WICC and its members, including the successful push to include representatives from south Cheyenne on the Laramie County School District 1 Board of Trustees beginning in 2022.

"Just being an adult, or a mother, a teacher, in Cheyenne, Wyoming – I think a group like this is really needed, and I think we have and will make a difference," coalition member Paulette Gadlin said.

"This particular group's effort...
is to be active. It's not just to care
about people, but to put the words into
action, and that's what I see this group
really doing politically, educationally,
personally, professionally, "coalition
member Sally Mecker said, also
emphasizing the diversity of backgrounds and political beliefs present in
the coalition. "All that effort really is
important because there's alot of
people that are uneducated about the
needs in our community."

Following the award presentation, the four coalition members who accepted the award planned to stay and volunteer at the Just Caring lunch at St. Joseph's, where they would be serving those experiencing homelessness or hunger.

"They're citizens, just like weare," Meeker said.

## Personal Growth and Involvement (PGI) or Professional Development

First off, there is a **difference between PGI and PDP**. I am sure most of you remember the PGI program and the passport where you kept track of your progress as you completed levels I thru X. The PGI program is still something you can continue to pursue. Optimist International (OI) currently has no plans to discontinue the PGI program. Changes may be coming later.

Why PGI? It gives you the opportunity to enhance your knowledge at the OI, District and Club levels. Not to mention improvement in leadership.

Sadly, some clubs have put PGI on the back burner, along with the mentor program. Both are needed to energize their club and to allow members to have a better understanding of the importance of leadership. Something to remember as you progress in your PGI passport, you can skip around in the different levels. Once you have completed level I and so on, you must contact a club officer or the PGI/PDP chair to certify completion. At this point, a Recognition Form will be completed and sent to the OI PGI/PDP Department. They in turn will send a copy of the Registration Form along with a color tab for the level completed to the Club President or PGI/PDP District chair. You will be recognized at a club meeting.

What is PDP all about? Interesting, the PDP brochure is a little different from the PGI passport in size and content. The focus as you will see is on business and management. There are 10 levels and 3 Advanced levels of PDP. Before you can start the Advanced levels, you must complete levels I thru X. Advanced levels must be completed within one year of starting the first advanced level and levels must be worked on consecutively. There are three levels; Bronze pin, Silver pin and Gold pin. It is up to you to decide if you want to continue with the PGI program or start the PDP. If you haven't tarted the PGI program, start with the PDP.

What type of recognition will you receive after you have completed levels I thru X of the PDP? Instead of the color tab for PGI completion, you will receive a certificate for the level completed. Once a club member has completed level I and so on you must contact a club officer or PGI/PDP to certify completion. A PGI/PDP Recognition Form will be completed and sent to the OI Leadership Development & Growth Department. They in turn will send a copy of the Registration Form along with a certificate for the level completed to the club President or PGI/PDP chair. You will be recognized at a club meeting.

The Advanced levels completed will follow the same process as PDP levels I thru X. Recognition should be at the District level.
